


RESULTS FROM A NATIONALLY REPRESENTATIVE SURVEY OF YOUNG PEOPLE AGE 18-30 TAKEN AUGUST 1-14...

- ✓ **Although whites and African Americans report being stopped by the police at similar rates, African Americans are more likely to report being arrested or harassed**
 - Twenty-four percent of African Americans report being harassed by police compared with 16 percent of Latino/as, 8 percent of whites, and 4 percent of Asian Americans

% who have been...





- ✓ **African Americans are less likely than other young adults to trust the police to do what is right and to believe police in their neighborhood are there to protect them**
 - Only 1 in 4 African Americans say they often trust the police to do what is right compared with half of Latino/as and Asian Americans and nearly 3 in 4 whites
 - Less than half of African Americans (48 percent) believe police in their neighborhood are there to protect them compared with 66 percent of Latino/as, 74 percent of Asian Americans, and 80 percent of whites
- ✓ **Majorities of young people across racial and ethnic groups believe the police do not treat all groups equally**
 - Ninety percent of African Americans, 84 percent of Latino/as, 81 percent of Asian Americans, and 63 percent of whites believe the police do not treat all groups equally
 - Young adults in each racial and ethnic group are more likely than everyone else to believe police mistreat their group

- ✓ **Majorities of young people of all races and ethnicities support Black Lives Matter, but there are racial and ethnic differences in opinions about whether the movement's rhetoric encourages violence against police**
 - Whites are three times more likely than African Americans to report the Black Lives Matter rhetoric encourages violence against police (66 percent vs. 19 percent)

- ✓ **Whites are less likely than other young adults to think the killing of black Americans by the police is part of a larger pattern or a very serious problem**
 - Whites (43 percent) are less likely to say the killing of black people by the police is a very serious problem than African Americans (91 percent), Latino/as (71 percent), and Asian Americans (63 percent)
 - Four in 10 whites think the killing of black Americans by the police is part of a larger pattern in the police's treatment of black Americans compared with majorities of African Americans (72 percent), Asian Americans (61 percent), and Latino/as (51 percent)
 - About 3 in 5 young people in all racial and ethnic groups report violence against the police is a very serious problem

Data come from GenForward, a survey of the Black Youth Project at the University of Chicago with The AP-NORC Center, with a nationally representative sample of 1,958 adults 18-30 years old. Interviews were completed online and using landlines and cellphones from August 1-14, 2016. Results have a margin of sampling error of +/- 3.9 percentage points.
