Key Findings

- When asked about the most important problem facing the country, a plurality of African American (39%) and Latinx (26%) young adults said racism, and it was the second most chosen response among Asian American (19%) and white (15%) young adults.
 - Police brutality was also second most chosen important problem for African Americans (16%), and third most among Asian American (8%), Latinx (9%), and white (7%) respondents.
 - The coronavirus pandemic also continues to be a top issue among young adults, with 10% of African American, 24% of Asian American, 15% of Latinx, and 18% of white young adults saying it is the most important problem.
- When thinking about the state of the United States' economy, a majority of Asian American (57%) and pluralities of African American (45%), Latinx (46%), and white (49%) young adults say the economy is either headed to or already in a recession.
- Significant numbers of young adults say the United States is headed to or already in a depression 40% African American, 35% Asian American, 40% Latinx, and 37% white.
- The financial lives of young adults are also impacted considerably by economic worries.
 - When asked how worried they are about the ability to pay an unexpected bill of \$1,000 right away, 40% of African American, 27% of Asian American, 37% of Latinx, and 33% of white young adults say they are very or extremely worried.
 - Young adults are less worried about their ability to pay for housing, with 20% of African American, 16% of Asian American, 23% of Latinx, and 16% of white young adults saying they are very or extremely worried.
 - When asked about keeping their current job or finding a good job in the future, 27% of African Americans, 30% of Asian Americans, 34% of Latinxs, and 23% of whites say they are very or extremely worried.
- A majority of Asian American (57%), and pluralities of African American (50%), Latinx (47%), and white (48%) young adults say they have a great deal or quite a bit of interest in following news about the 2020 presidential election.
- Majorities of African American (53%), Asian American (55%), Latinx (50%), and white (54%) young adults say they voted or plan to vote in their state's primary or caucus for the 2020 election.
- Majorities of African American (51%), Asian American (54%), and white (52%) young adults, and a
 plurality of Latinx (38%) young adults say they definitely will vote in the presidential election being
 held in November 2020.
- A majority of white (54%) young adults believe Donald Trump will win re-election in 2020, while majorities of African American (72%), Asian American (62%), and Latinx (63%) young adults believeTrump will lose.

- Majorities of African American (64%), Asian American (63%), Latinx (52%) young adults, and a
 plurality of white (38%) young adults say they would vote for Joe Biden if the 2020 presidential
 election were being held today.
- Majorities of young adult Trump supporters across race and ethnicity say they are voting for Trump because they are enthusiastic about their candidate versus motivated because they dislike the other candidate[s] (65% African American, 62% Asian American, 58% Latinx, and 57% white of Trump supporters say they are enthusiastic for Trump).
- Majorities of Biden supporters across race and ethnicity say they are voting for Biden because theydislike the other candidate[s] (51% African American, 74% Asian American, 60% Latinx, and 77% white of Biden supporters).
- Joe Biden is significantly more favorable among African American (56%), Asian American (48%), and Latinx (47%) young adults compared to Donald Trump (12% African American, 13% Asian American, 20% Latinx).
- White young adults are split in terms of their favorability of Joe Biden (31%) and Donald Trump (31%).
- When asked about potential Democratic vice presidential running mates with Joe Biden, pluralities of African American (31%), Latinx (29%), and white (39%) young adults chose "Someone else" when presented with a list of hypothetical front-runners.
- Among African American young adults, Senator Harris (11%), Mayor Bottoms (11%), and Senator Warren (10%) are the top choices for Biden's VP.
- Harris (21% Asian American, 14% Latinx, 9% white) and Warren (28% Asian American, 18% Latinx, 20% white) are the most preferred VP candidates among Asian American, Latinx, and white young adults.
- A plurality of Latinx (48%) young adults say vote by mail would make them more likely to vote in November 2020. While 42% of African American, 45% of Asian American, and 35% of white young adults say the same.
- A majority of white (54%) young adults say if their state allowed them to vote by mail it would not change whether they vote or not.
- African American and Asian American young adults are more split in whether they are more likely to vote (42/45%, respectively) or it wouldn't change whether they vote or not (41/47%, respectively).
- Majorities of young adults across race and ethnicity somewhat or strongly favor allowing people to
 vote by mail instead of in-person without requiring them to give a reason (69% African American,
 85% Asian American, 67% Latinx, 66% white).
- When asked about problems with the election, the most selected response among African American (41%), Latinx (39%), and white (45%) young adults is increased voter fraud. Eligible voters denied right to vote is most selected among Asian Americans (48%).

- When thinking about allegations of unwanted sexual advances against women by Donald Trump, 85% of African American, 83% of Asian American, 66% of Latinx, and 69% of white young adults are say the allegations are mostly or absolutely true.
- When thinking about allegations of unwanted sexual advances against women by Joe Biden, 39% of African American, 46% of Asian American, 54% of Latinx, and 63% of white young adults are say the allegations are mostly or absolutely true.
- Majorities of young adults across race and ethnicity say Donald Trump is a racist (81% African American, 83% Asian American, 73% Latinx, 62% white), whereas majorities of young adults also say Joe Biden is not racist (73% African American, 73%. Asian American, 68% Latinx, 62% white).

STUDY METHODOLOGY

The GenForward April survey is a project of Professor Cathy J. Cohen at the University of Chicago. Interviews were conducted with a representative sample from GenForwardSM, a nationally representative survey panel of adults ages 18-36 recruited and administered by NORC at the University of Chicago.

A total of 3,133 interviews were conducted between May 29th and June 11th, 2020 with adults ages 18-36, including completed interviews with 798 African American young adults, 474 Asian American young adults, 822 Latinx young adults, 990 white young adults, and 48 young adults with other racial and ethnic backgrounds. The survey was offered in English and Spanish and via telephone and web modes.

The GenForward survey was built from two sample sources:

- Fifty-three percent of the completed interviews are sourced from NORC's AmeriSpeak® Panel and from the Black Youth Project (BYP) panel of young adults recruited by NORC. AmeriSpeak is a probability-based panel that also uses address-based sample but sourced from the NORC National Frame with enhanced sample coverage. During the initial recruitment phase of the AmeriSpeak panel, randomly selected U.S. households were sampled with a known, non-zero probability of selection and then contacted by U.S. mail, email, telephone, and field interviewers (face-to-face). The BYP sample is from a probability-based household panel that uses an address-based sample from a registered voter database of the entire U.S. Households were selected using stratified random sampling to support over-sampling of households with African Americans, Latinxs, and Asian Americans ages 18-36. NORC contacted sampled households by U.S. mail and by telephone, inviting them to register and participate in public opinion surveys twice a month.
- The AmeriSpeak panel sample was supplemented with respondents from the Dynata nonprobability online opt-in panel. Forty-seven percent of the completed interviews are sourced from the Dynata panel. To help to reduce potential bias in the nonprobability sample, Dynata attempted to balance the nonprobability respondent sample by age, race and ethnicity, gender, and partisanship. In order to incorporate the nonprobability sample, NORC used TrueNorth calibration services, an innovative hybrid calibration approach developed at NORC based on small area estimation methods in order to explicitly account for potential bias associated with the nonprobability sample. The purpose of TrueNorth calibration is to adjust the weights for the nonprobability sample so as to bring weighted distributions of the nonprobability sample in line with the population distribution for characteristics correlated with the survey variables. Such calibration adjustments help to reduce potential bias, yielding more accurate population estimates.

Panelists on both the BYP and AmeriSpeak panels are invited to register for the panel via the web or by telephone to participate in public opinion surveys.

Of the 3,133 completed interviews in the GenForward July survey, 96 percent were completed by web and 4 percent by telephone. The survey completion rate is 18.2 percent. The weighted AAPOR RR3 panel recruitment rate is 11.2 percent and the weighted household panel retention rate is 88.5 percent, for a cumulative AAPOR Response Rate 3 of 1.8 percent. The overall margin of sampling error is +/- 2.56 percentage points at the 95 percent confidence level, including the design effect. Among subgroups, the margin of sampling error at the 95 percent confidence level is +/- 4.93 percentage points for African

Americans, +/- 5.84 percentage points for Asian Americans, +/- 5.36 percentage points for Latinxs, and +/- 3.82 percentage points for whites. The margin of sampling error at the 95 percent confidence level is +/- 3.37 percentage points for Democrats, +/- 5.00 percentage points for Republicans, +/- 5.76 percentage points for Independents.

To encourage cooperation, respondents were offered incentives for completing the survey that ranged from the cash-equivalent of \$3 to the cash-equivalent of \$10.

The interviews from the two probability-based sample sources were combined for statistical weighting and analysis. The combined panel samples provide sample coverage of approximately 97% of the U.S. household population. Those excluded from the sample include people with P.O. Box only addresses, some addresses not listed in the USPS Delivery Sequence File, and some newly constructed dwellings. The statistical weights incorporate the appropriate probability of selection for the BYP and AmeriSpeak samples, nonresponse adjustments, and also, raking ratio adjustments to population benchmarks for 18-64-year-old adults. A poststratification process is used to adjust for any survey nonresponse as well as any non-coverage or under- and over-sampling resulting from the study-specific sample design. The poststratification process was done separately for each racial/ethnic group and involved the following variables: age, gender, education, and census region. The weighted data, which reflect the U.S. population of adults ages 18-36, and the 18-36-year-old populations for African Americans, Latinxs, Asian Americans, and non-Latinx whites, were used for all analyses.
